## Laughing Stock: Funny, Loving Look at Amateur Theatre

W<sup>E</sup> ALL LOVE amateur theatre. It strives to present wonderful performances, but despite the well-meaning intentions of a dedicated cast, a live show sometimes produces unexpected — and hilarious — results. That's the premise of *Laughing Stock*, the next Players of Utica production which opens on April 5 at the Players Theatre. Players' President **Art Felshaw** spoke with director **Stephen Wagner** about the comedy.

ART: What is it about this play that got your attention?

**STEPHEN:** I like to direct comedies, especially, because they allow for a lot of freedom with characterization, physical improvisation, and almost anything that we can add to the show that makes it fun and funny. And with a farce like *Laughing Stock*, you can let your imagination run wild. What I also like about this play is that although it has many farcical elements, it also has a lot of heart. Yes, it is a crazy comedy about a small, somewhat inept theatre group whose shows are plagued by mishaps, but it also shows the affection that the company members have for one another and for the experience of creating live theatre.


ART: Characters that an audience can relate to always make them laugh. What are some of the relatable characters in the play?

**STEPHEN:** It's a pretty big cast—14 people—so there is a wide array of characters that the audience can either relate to or instantly recognize: egotistical actors, a first-time director who has no idea what she's doing, aging actors who perhaps should have retired years ago, young actors who need much more experience, short-tempered managers who struggle with managing the group, designers given way too much to design in a short time, and a director who is desperately trying to hold it all together while taking on too much himself. They all combine to create wonderful comedy.

### ART: How often does the cast rehearse and for how long each time?

STEPHEN: We rehearse for five or six weeks before opening,

and that's typically three days a week. When we get closer to opening, we might add a fourth or fifth day. And generally we rehearse from 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. We started rehearsing a bit early for this production—allowing seven weeks because it has some highly technical scenes that have to be worked out and perfected.





ART: As a long time-director, what is the most challenging thing about mounting a production like *Laughing Stock*?


**STEPHEN:** Working with a large cast always has challenges, from a logistical point of view, because each actor has a job or family commitments and we have to create a rehearsal schedule that works for everyone and for the production. The other greatest challenge are those highly technical scenes I mentioned that have to be rehearsed over and over to work out the timing and all the comic possibilities to get the absolute most out of them. Luckily, I have a very good cast of experienced, enthusiastic actors who are dedicated to putting together a great show.

ART: If someone wants to audition for a play, what advice would you give?

**STEPHEN:** First, I would advise learning something about the play before even going into the audition. Sometimes scripts can be found online or in a library, or at least detailed synopses can be found online. With that information, they can usually identify a specific character that they wish to audition for. Of course, they

don't *have* to come in with a specific character in mind, they can just see how the audition is conducted and perhaps discover how the director might see them fitting in. Many auditions are cold readings from a script, which can be challenging because you're being asked to create a character and get involved in a situation on the spot. Hopefully, the director will give some information to work with. The *(Continued on page 2)*

most important thing for someone auditioning, I think, is to not hold back. Don't worry about doing the character "wrong." A director often wants to see how brave and how open an actor can be on stage and how well they can take direction. So my advice: Be fearless and be bold.


